We appreciate the time our members spent researching answers to these questions and we hope you find the results a valuable resource.


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




DOES YOUR AGENCY ADMINISTER THE 319 PROGRAM IN YOUR STATE?




ARE YOUR CONSERVATION DISTRICT OFFICIALS REQUIRED TO BE LANDOWNERS



ARE YOUR CONSERVATION DISTRICT OFFICIALS REQUIRED TO BE FARMERS




ARE CONSERVATION DISTRICT OFFICIALS RESTRICTED IN PARTICIPATING IN STATE COST-SHARE PROGRAMS








ARE YOUR CONSERVATION DISTRICTS CO-LOCATED WITH NRCS





HAS LOCALLY-LED CONSERVATION BEEN COMPROMISED IN YOUR STATE IN RECENT YEARS




