## INTRODUCTION

The phrase 'urban and community conservation' covers low populated areas to large metro ones, from villages to towns to cities, and the entire interface in between. There is an interdependency among all these systems, whether urban, community, or rural. One cannot function without the other. Cities and communities need the clean water and open space of agricultural lands while farmers need the urban markets and businesses. Conservation districts across the nation are involved in a wide array of urban and community conservation activities that benefit all land uses.

### **PURPOSE**

A National Urban, Community and Coastal Conservation Strategy for conservation districts was adopted by the NACD Board in February 2007. The Strategy indicated the need for an inventory of districts' activities in these areas as the underlying element of all the actions. This information will be used to showcase districts' work, identify their training and tools needs, and seek additional federal resources and support.
