Conservation District Election Laws



South Dakota's conservation district elections are primarily governed by the South Dakota election laws.



- Notice of Vacancy must be published for each position that will be vacant the coming year. Cost of publication is paid by the district.
- Valid nominating petitions to be provided by the State Conservation Commission.
 - Petitions must be approved by the Secretary of State's office.
- Petitions must be signed by twenty-five or more registered voters in the district.
- Unopposed candidates are automatically elected and certified to fill the office.

Specific to conservation districts:

- 5-member board,
- 4-year terms
- Non-partisan ballot.



- The supervisors must represent certain segments of the public:
 - Three must be rural landowners or occupiers;
 - One must be a taxpayer of real property; and
 - One must be a resident of an urban area.



- Each supervisor must reside within the district he/she serves
- The supervisor election is held in conjunction with the November general election.
- All voters eligible to vote in a general election may participate in the supervisor election.



- Vacancy occurring during first 2 years of the 4-year term
 - the remaining board members appoint someone to fill the position until the next general election.
 - At that time a supervisor should circulate a petition for the remaining two years of the four-year term.



- Vacancy occurring during last 2 years of the 4-year term
 - the remaining board members appoint someone to fill the position until the next general election.
 - At that time a supervisor should circulate a petition for a full four-year term.
- The purpose is to maintain the established rotation of supervisor elections.



 An appointed supervisor cannot be automatically carried over without going through the election process. To continue to serve without at least a nomination by petition, he must be reappointed by the board.



- A supervisor is no longer qualified to serve if
 - he/she moves out of the conservation district
 - He/she resigns
 - He/she dies
- Any supervisor of a conservation district may be removed by the State Conservation Commission upon notice and hearing, for neglect of duty or malfeasance in office, but for no other reason.
